# Existence of Global Attractor for LS Type Equations

#### Abstract

The global attractor problem of the long－short wave equations with periodic boundary condition was studied．The existence of global attractor of this problem was proved by means of a uniform a priori estimate for time．


Key words：long－short wave equations；a priori estimate；global attractor．
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## 1．Introduction

The LS type equations

$$
\begin{gathered}
i S_{t}+S_{x x}-L S=0, \\
L_{t}+|S|_{x}^{2}=0
\end{gathered}
$$

were first derived by Djordjevic and Redekopp in［1］，where $S$ is the envelope of the short wave， and $L$ is the amplitude of long wave and is real．This system describes the resonance interaction between the long wave and the short wave．Furthermore，Benney ${ }^{[2]}$ ，Kawahara and Sugimoto ${ }^{[3]}$ derived the following system

where $\alpha, \gamma, m$ and $l$ are real constants．This system describes the general theory of water wave interaction in a nonlinear medium ${ }^{[2-3]}$ ．Guo obtained the existence of global solution for long－ short wave equations in［4］．Zhang and Guo have studied the longtime behavior of the solution for generalized long－short wave equations ${ }^{[5]}$ ．Guo and Wang have studied the approximation inertial manifolds for LS type equations ${ }^{[6]}$ ．

In this paper，we consider the existence of a global attractor for the class of the generalized LS type equations：

\end{gather*}

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with the initial conditions

\left.u\right|_{t=0}=u_{0}(x),\left.\quad n\right|_{t=0}=n_{0}(x), \quad x \in \Omega=(-D, D), D>0 \tag{3}
\end{equation*}

and the periodic boundary conditions

u(x+2 D, t)=u(x, t), \quad n(x+2 D, t)=n(x, t) \tag{4}
\end{equation*}

where $\alpha, \beta, \gamma, \delta$ and $l$ are positive constants. $u(x, t)$ is an unknown complex valued vector, $n(x, t)$ is an unknown real valued function, and $h_{1}(x)$ and $h_{2}(x)$ are given in $L^{2}(\Omega), g(s)$ and $f(s)(0 \leq s<\infty)$ are smooth real valued functions which satisfy

where $\sigma, \nu$ and $c_{i}(i=1,2,3,4)$ are positive constants. By means of a uniform a priori estimates for time, and Temam's ${ }^{[7]}$ methods, we obtain the above results.

Throughout this paper, $c$ will be used to indicate generic constants and dependent of data $\left(\alpha, \beta, \gamma, \delta, l, f, g, h_{1}, h_{2}, R\right)$. We denote by $\|\cdot\|$ the norm of $H=L_{\text {per }}^{2}(\Omega)$ (real or complex space) with the corresponding inner product $(\cdot, \cdot)$, by $\|\cdot\|_{p}$ the norm of $L_{\text {per }}^{p}(\Omega)$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty\left(\|\cdot\|_{2}=\right.$ $\|\cdot\|)$, and by $\|\cdot\|_{X}$ the norm of any Banach space $X$.

## 2. The global smooth solution

In this section, we derive uniform a priori estimates for time which enable us to show the existence of the global smooth solution.

Lemma 1 If $u_{0}, h_{1} \in L^{2}(\Omega)$, then for the solution ( $u, n$ ) of problem (1)-(4) we have

where $c_{0}$ and $t_{0}$ depend on the data $\left(\alpha, h_{1}, R\right)$ and $R$ when $\left\|u_{0}\right\| \leq R$.
Proof Taking the inner product of (1) with $u$ in $H$, we obtain

\end{equation*}

Taking the imaginary part of (8), we find

\frac{1}{2} \frac{\mathrm{~d}}{\mathrm{~d} t}\|u\|^{2}+\alpha\|u\|^{2}+\beta\left\|u_{x}\right\|^{2}+\operatorname{Im}\left(h_{1}, u\right)=0
$$

By Young inequality and Gronwall lemma we have Lemma 1. Furthermore,

Lemma 2 Suppose that (5) and (6) hold. Then we have

where $c_{1}$ and $t_{1}$ depend on the data $\left(\alpha, \beta, \gamma, \delta, f, g, h_{1}, h_{2}\right)$ and $R$ when $\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{H_{p e r}^{1}} \leq R$ and $\left\|n_{0}\right\| \leq R$.

Proof Taking the inner product of (2) with $n$ in $H$, we see that

\end{equation*}

Taking the imaginary part of the inner product of (1) with $u_{x x}$ in $H$, we obtain that

\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{~d} t}\left\|u_{x}\right\|^{2}+2 \alpha\left\|u_{x}\right\|^{2}+2 \beta\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}=2 \operatorname{Im}\left(g u, u_{x x}\right)-2 \operatorname{Im}\left(n u, u_{x x}\right)+2 \operatorname{Im}\left(h_{1}, u_{x x}\right) \tag{12}
\end{equation*}

In the following, $\forall \rho>0$, when $t$ is large enough, we have

\left|\operatorname{Im}\left(g\left(|u|^{2}\right) u, u_{x x}\right)\right| \leq c\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{\frac{3}{4}} \cdot\|u\|^{\frac{5}{4}}\left\|g^{\prime}\right\|_{L^{2}} \leq c\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{\frac{5-2 \sigma}{4}}\|u\|^{\frac{15-2 \sigma}{4}} \leq \frac{\rho}{2}\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+c(\rho), \\
\left|\operatorname{Im}\left(n u, u_{x x}\right)\right| \leq c\left\|n_{x}\right\|\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{\frac{3}{4}}\|u\|^{\frac{5}{4}} \leq \frac{\rho}{2}\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2}+\frac{\rho}{2}\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+c(\rho) .
\end{gathered}
$$

Combining (11) and (12), we get that

& \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{~d} t}\left(\|n\|^{2}+\left\|u_{x}\right\|^{2}\right)+2 \alpha\left\|u_{x}\right\|^{2}+2 \beta\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+2 \delta\|n\|^{2}+2 \gamma\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2} \\
& \quad \leq 2 \rho\|n\|^{2}+\rho\left\|u_{x}\right\|^{2}+2 \rho\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2}+4 \rho\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+\frac{1}{\rho}\left(\left\|h_{1}\right\|^{2}+\left\|h_{2}\right\|^{2}\right)+c(\rho)
\end{aligned}
$$

Let $E=\|n\|^{2}+\left\|u_{x}\right\|^{2}$. Assume that $\alpha \leq \delta$, then we see that

& \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{~d} t} E+\alpha E+2 \beta\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+(2 \delta-\alpha)\|n\|^{2}+2 \gamma\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2}+\alpha\left\|u_{x}\right\|^{2} \\
& \quad \leq 2 \rho\|n\|^{2}+\rho\left\|u_{x}\right\|^{2}+2 \rho\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2}+4 \rho\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+\frac{1}{\rho}\left(\left\|h_{1}\right\|^{2}+\left\|h_{2}\right\|^{2}\right)+c(\rho)
\end{aligned}
$$

Let $\rho \leq \min \left\{\alpha, \gamma, \frac{\beta}{2}, \delta-\frac{\alpha}{2}\right\}$, we find that

\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{~d} t} E+\alpha E \leq \frac{1}{\rho}\left(\left\|h_{1}\right\|^{2}+\left\|h_{2}\right\|^{2}\right)+c(\rho), \quad \forall t \geq t_{0} \tag{13}
\end{equation*}

By Gronwall lemma we see that

E(t) \leq E\left(t_{0}\right) e^{-\alpha\left(t-t_{0}\right)}+\frac{1}{\alpha}\left(1-e^{-\alpha\left(t-t_{0}\right)}\right)\left(\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{1}\right\|^{2}+\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{2}\right\|^{2}+c\right), \quad \forall t \geq t_{0}
$$

Note

$$
\left|E\left(t_{0}\right)\right|=\left\|n\left(t_{0}\right)\right\|^{2}+\left\|u_{x}\left(t_{0}\right)\right\|^{2} \leq 2 R^{2}
$$

where $R$ satisfies $\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{H^{1}} \leq R,\left\|n_{0}\right\| \leq R$. Then, we infer that

E(t) \leq \frac{2}{\alpha}\left(\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{1}\right\|^{2}+\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{2}\right\|^{2}+c\right), \quad \forall t \geq t_{1} \tag{14}
\end{equation*}

where $t_{1}=\max \left\{t_{0}, t_{0}+\frac{1}{\alpha} \ln \frac{2 \alpha R^{2}-\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{1}\right\|^{2}-\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{2}\right\|^{2}+c}{\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{1}\right\|^{2}+\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{2}\right\|^{2}+c}\right\}$.
By (14) it follows that

which concludes Lemma 2. If $\alpha \geq \delta$, we can also deduce the same result. Furthermore,

By Agmon inequality, Lemmas 1 and 2 imply that

Lemma 3 Suppose that Lemma 2 holds and that $h_{2}, h_{1} \in H_{p e r}^{1}(\Omega)$. Then we have

\end{equation*}

where $c_{2}$ and $t_{2}$ depend on the data $\left(\alpha, \beta, \gamma, \delta, l, f, g, h_{1}, h_{2}\right)$ and $R$ when $\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{H_{\text {per }}^{2}} \leq R$ and $\left\|n_{0}\right\|_{H_{\text {per }}^{1}} \leq R$.

Proof Taking the imaginary part of the inner product of (1) with $u_{x x x x}$ in $H$, we see that

\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{~d} t}\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+2 \alpha\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+2 \beta\left\|u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}=-2 \operatorname{Im}\left(g u, u_{x^{4}}\right)+2 \operatorname{Im}\left(n u, u_{x^{4}}\right)-2 \operatorname{Im}\left(h_{1}, u_{x^{4}}\right) .
$$

Taking the inner product of (2) with $n_{x x}$ in $H$, we find that

\frac{1}{2} \frac{\mathrm{~d}}{\mathrm{~d} t}\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2}+\delta\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2}+\gamma\left\|n_{x x}\right\|^{2}=\int_{\Omega}|u|_{x}^{2} n_{x x} \mathrm{~d} x+\int_{\Omega} f\left(|u|^{2}\right) n_{x x} \mathrm{~d} x+l\left\|n_{x}\right\|_{L^{3}}^{3}+\int_{\Omega} h_{2} n_{x x} \mathrm{~d} x .
$$

Similar to the method of Lemma 2, we calculate and derive that

& \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{~d} t}\left(\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2}+\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}\right)+2 \alpha\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+2 \beta\left\|u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}+2 \delta\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2}+2 \gamma\left\|n_{x x}\right\|^{2} \\
& \quad \leq \rho\left\|n_{x}\right\|^{2}+3 \rho\left\|u_{x x}\right\|^{2}+4 \rho\left\|n_{x x}\right\|^{2}+6 \rho\left\|u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}+\frac{1}{\rho}\left(\left\|h_{1 x}\right\|^{2}+\left\|h_{2 x}\right\|^{2}\right)+c(\rho)
\end{aligned}
$$

And we have

$$

Furthermore,

\overline{\lim }_{t \rightarrow \infty}\left(\left\|u_{x x}(\cdot, t)\right\|^{2}+\left\|n_{x}(\cdot, t)\right\|^{2}\right) \leq \frac{2}{\alpha}\left(\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{1 x}\right\|^{2}+\frac{1}{\rho}\left\|h_{2 x}\right\|^{2}+\max _{t \geq t_{2}} c\right) \equiv E_{2} \tag{18}
\end{equation*}

The proof of Lemma 3 is completed.
Lemma 4 Suppose that Lemma 3 holds, and that $h_{1} \in H_{p e r}^{2}(\Omega), h_{2} \in H_{p e r}^{1}(\Omega)$. Then we have

where the constant $c$ depends on the data $(\alpha, \beta, \gamma, \delta, l, f, g),\left\|h_{1}\right\|_{H^{2}},\left\|h_{2}\right\|_{H^{1}},\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{H_{p e r}^{2}},\left\|n_{0}\right\|_{H_{p e r}^{1}}$ and $T$.

Proof Taking the imaginary part of the inner product of (1) with $t^{2} \frac{\partial^{6} u}{\partial x^{6}}$ in $H$, we see that

& \frac{1}{2} \frac{\mathrm{~d}}{\mathrm{~d} t}\left\|t u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}+\alpha\left\|t u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}+\beta\left\|t u_{x x x x}\right\|^{2} \\
& \quad=t\left\|u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}+\operatorname{Im}\left(g u, t^{2} \frac{\partial^{6} u}{\partial x^{6}}\right)-\operatorname{Im}\left(n u, t^{2} \frac{\partial^{6} u}{\partial x^{6}}\right)+\operatorname{Im}\left(h_{1}, t^{2} \frac{\partial^{6} u}{\partial x^{6}}\right) \tag{20}
\end{align*}
$$

Taking the inner product of (2) with $t^{2} n_{x x x x}$ in $H$, we find that

& \frac{1}{2} \frac{\mathrm{~d}}{\mathrm{~d} t}\left\|t n_{x x}\right\|^{2}+\delta\left\|t n_{x x}\right\|^{2}+\gamma\left\|t n_{x x x}\right\|^{2} \\
& \quad=t\left\|n_{x x}\right\|^{2}-\left(|u|_{x}^{2}, t^{2} n_{x x x x}\right)-l\left(n n_{x}, t^{2} n_{x^{4}}\right)-\left(f\left(|u|^{2}\right), t^{2} n_{x x x x}\right)-\left(h_{2}, t^{2} n_{x x x x}\right) \tag{21}
\end{align*}
$$

Similar to the method of Lemma 2, we calculate every term in (20) and (21) and note that

t\left\|u_{x x x}\right\|^{2} \leq \frac{\beta}{8}\left\|t u_{x x x x}\right\|^{2}+c, \quad t\left\|n_{x x}\right\|^{2} \leq \frac{\gamma}{8}\left\|t n_{x x x}\right\|^{2}+c
$$

where the constant $c$ depends on data $(\alpha, \beta, \gamma, \delta, l, f, g),\left\|u_{o}\right\|_{H^{2}},\left\|n_{0}\right\|_{H^{1}}$ and $T$. We find that

& \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{~d} t}\left(\left\|t n_{x x}\right\|^{2}+\left\|t u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}\right)+2 \alpha\left\|t u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}+\beta\left\|t u_{x x x x}\right\|^{2}+2 \delta\left\|t n_{x x}\right\|^{2}+\gamma\left\|t n_{x x x}\right\|^{2} \\
& \quad \leq c\left(\left\|t n_{x x}\right\|^{2}+\left\|t u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}+\left\|h_{1 x x}\right\|^{2}+\left\|h_{2 x}\right\|^{2}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

And then

\left\|u_{x x x}(t)\right\|^{2}+\left\|n_{x x}(t)\right\|^{2} \leq \frac{c}{t}, \quad \forall t>0 .
$$

By an induction argument, Galerkin method and the techniques used in [4], we can easily obtain the main results:

Lemma 5 Suppose that (5) and (6) hold, $h_{1} \in H_{\text {per }}^{2}(\Omega), h_{2} \in H_{\mathrm{per}}^{1}(\Omega)$ and $u_{0}(x) \in H_{\mathrm{per}}^{3}(\Omega), n_{0}(x) \in$ $H_{\text {per }}^{2}(\Omega)$. Then we have

& \sup _{0 \leq t \leq T}\left\|n_{N}(\cdot, t)\right\|_{H^{2}(\Omega)}^{2} \leq c \tag{23}
\end{align*}

where $u_{N}(x, t), n_{N}(x, t)$ is the approximate solution of the problems (1)-(4), and $c$ depends on the data $(\alpha, \beta, \gamma, \delta, l, f, g),\left\|h_{1}\right\|_{H^{2}},\left\|h_{2}\right\|_{H^{1}},\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{H^{3}}$ and $\left\|n_{0}\right\|_{H^{2}}$, and is independent of $N$.

Theorem 1 If the conditions in Lemma 5 are satisfied, then there exists a unique global solution $u(x, t), n(x, t)$ for the initial value problems (1)-(4):

## 3. The global attractor

In order to prove the existence of global attractor of problems (1)-(4), we need the following result.

Lemma $6^{[7]}$ Let $E$ be a Banach Space. Let $\left\{S_{t}, t \geq 0\right\}$ be a set of semi-group operators, i.e. $S_{t}: E \rightarrow E$ satisfies

S_{t} S_{\tau}=S_{t+\tau}, S_{0}=I
$$

where $I$ is the identity operator. We also assume the following.
(i) Operator $S_{t}$ is bounded, i.e. for each $R>0$, there exists a constant $c(R)$ such that $\|u\|_{E} \leq R$ implies

\left\|S_{t} u\right\|_{E} \leq c(R), \quad t \in[0, \infty)
$$

(ii) There is a bounded absorbing set $B_{0} \subset E$, i.e. for any bounded set $B \subset E$, there exists a constant $T$ such that

S_{t} B \subset B_{0}, \quad t \geq T
$$

(iii) $S_{t}$ is a completely continuous operator for $T>0$.

Then the operator semi-group $S_{t}$ has a compact global attractor.
Theorem 2 Suppose that problems (1)-(4) have a global smooth solution and that the conditions in Lemma 4 are satisfied, then there exists a global attractor $A$ of the periodic initial value problem (1)-(4), i.e. there is a set $A$, such that
(i) $S_{t} A=A, t \in R^{+}$;
(ii) $\lim _{t \rightarrow \infty} \operatorname{dist}\left(S_{t} B, A\right)=0$, for any bounded set $B \subset E$,
where

\operatorname{dist}(X, Y)=\sup _{x \in X} \inf _{y \in Y}\|x-y\|_{E}
$$

and $S_{t}$ is a semi-group operator generated by problems (1)-(4).
Proof On account of the result of Lemma 6, we shall prove this theorem by checking the conditions in Lemma 6. Under the assumptions of the theorem, we know that there exists an operator semi-group generated by problems (1)-(4). We set the Banach Space

E=H_{\mathrm{per}}^{2}(\Omega) \times H_{\mathrm{per}}^{1}(\Omega), \quad(u, n) \in E,\|(u, n)\|_{E}^{2}=\|u\|_{H^{2}}^{2}+\|n\|_{H^{1}}^{2}
$$

and $S_{t}: E \rightarrow E$. Using the results of Lemmas $1-3$, and assuming that $B \subset E$ belongs to the ball $\left\{\|(u, n)\|_{E} \leq R\right\}$, we have

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left\|S_{t}\left(u_{0}, n_{0}\right)\right\|_{E}^{2} & =\|(u, n)\|_{E}^{2}=\|u\|_{H^{2}}^{2}+\|n\|_{H^{1}}^{2} \\
& \leq C\left(R^{2},\left\|h_{1}\right\|_{H^{1}}^{2}+\left\|h_{2}\right\|_{H^{1}}^{2}\right), \quad t \geq 0,\left(u_{0}, n_{0}\right) \in B
\end{aligned}
$$

This means that $\left\{S_{t}\right\}$ is uniformly bounded in $E$. Furthermore, from the results of the Lemmas $1-3$ we see that

$$
\left\|S_{t}\left(u_{0}, n_{0}\right)\right\|_{E}^{2}=\|u\|_{H^{2}}^{2}+\|n\|_{H^{1}}^{2} \leq 2\left(E_{0}+E_{1}+E_{2}\right), \quad t \geq t_{0}\left(R,\left\|h_{1}\right\|_{H^{1}}^{2}+\left\|h_{2}\right\|_{H^{1}}^{2}\right)
$$

Hence,

$$
\bar{A}=\left\{(u(\cdot, t), n(\cdot, t)) \in E,\|(u, n)\|_{E}^{2} \leq 2\left(E_{0}+E_{1}+E_{2}\right)\right\}
$$

is a bounded absorbing set of the operator semi－group $S_{t}$ ．From Lemma 4 we know that

$$
\left\|u_{x x x}\right\|^{2}+\left\|n_{x x}\right\|^{2} \leq \frac{c}{t} \quad \forall t>0,\left\|\left(u_{0}, n_{0}\right)\right\|_{E} \leq R .
$$

By the compact imbedding $H^{3} \times H^{2} \hookrightarrow H^{2} \times H^{1}$ ，the operator semi－group $S_{t}: E \rightarrow E$ for $t>0$ is completely continuous．The proof of the theorem is now completed．

Remark Just as the remarks in［7］，the attractor $A$ obtained in Theorem 2 is the $\omega$－limit set of the absorbing set $\bar{A}$ ，i．e．

A=\omega(\bar{A})=\bigcap_{\tau \geq 0} \overline{\bigcup_{t \geq \tau} S_{t} \bar{A}} .
